Chair's Message

Dear Colleagues,

As we close out the year, I want to extend my heartfelt thanks for all that you do across our Department; that is, in our hospitals, clinics, classrooms, research programs, and communities. Your dedication, compassion, and teamwork are the backbone of UCSF Surgery.

I also want to reflect on the energy and joy of our recent Department Holiday Party. It was wonderful to see faculty, staff, and residents together – and equally meaningful to welcome so many partners and plus-ones. Building a community that is genuinely inclusive of the people who support us outside the workplace matters. We are committed to continuing and strengthening this approach next year. Thank you to our Chair's Office staff – **Sabrina Lum, Crystalin Bonjoc, Mandy Li, and Carrie Triplett** – who worked hard to make the event a success.

This month, I also want to highlight new research our team published in **JAMA Surgery**, examining promotion pathways for academic surgeons (<https://t.co/OvWEjj7Iyc>). Our national cohort study of more than 6,000 faculty found that surgeons who changed institutions were significantly more likely to be promoted within 10 years, with the strongest effect among faculty underrepresented in medicine. At the same time, the findings point to persistent disparities for women and UIM faculty who remain at their home institutions, underscoring the importance of equitable internal pathways for advancement. Deliberate institutional efforts are needed to support the long-term career development of faculty and create more internal opportunities for advancement.

It is interesting that in the **2025 Community Climate Survey** results just released here at UCSF, our UCSF Surgery faculty reported having a UCSF mentor or sponsor at significantly higher rates than colleagues in other departments at UCSF. While this is encouraging, we need to continue to actively and intentionally focus on the advancement of our faculty and trainees, and especially the professional development of our staff. We are recruiting many new faculty colleagues this year (**please tune into the faculty recruitment chalk talks live or the video recordings that Stephanie Lee makes available afterward**), but retention efforts remain even more important.

These data reinforce what we strive to build here at UCSF: clear, supportive, and fair structures that help people grow – and stay. Investing in mentorship, recognition, and transparent promotion practices remains central to who we are and who we aim to be. Thank you again for the extraordinary work and spirit you bring to our community. I look forward to all we will accomplish together in the year ahead.

EDUCATION



Dr. Raghav Chandra, Cardiothoracic Surgery Fellow, published a study in **Nature Medicine** in October alongside a multidisciplinary team of co-authors. The study, **"Macrovascular tumor infiltration and circulating tumor cell cluster dynamics in patients with cancer approaching the end of life,"** offers important insight into tumor behavior and disease progression during late-stage cancer, advancing our understanding of metastatic biology.



Dr. Maria Castro, General Surgery Research Fellow, received the **First Place Tepas Award** at the **Pediatric Trauma Society Annual Meeting** for her manuscript and podium presentation, **"A New Pediatric Trauma Center Quality Benchmarking Metric."** Her work focused on functional outcomes after pediatric injury at Benioff Children's Hospital Oakland is conducted under the mentorship of **Dr. Aaron Jensen**.

Dr. Kirkpatrick Fergus, General Surgery Resident, published his research in **Genome Medicine** on integrating polygenic risk scores into personalized breast cancer screening. 

A Transformational Year for Surgical Science: Seven Major Faculty Awards

Seven faculty members ushered in FY 25 by securing major federal awards totaling more than **\$22.5 million**. Notably, five awards exceed \$2 million, ranging from

\$2.4M to \$7.2M – a scale of funding that significantly expands the Department's capacity for groundbreaking investigation.

We also celebrate a critical milestone for our next generation of research leaders:

4 faculty members, 2 surgeon scientists, and 2 scientists from the **Transplant** and **Pediatric Surgery Divisions** received their first **RO1** or equivalent grant.

Securing the first RO1 is a defining moment in any research career. These accomplishments signal not only the strength of our faculty but also the future trajectory of surgical science at UCSF. Together, these awards reinforce UCSF Surgery's standing as a national leader in scientific innovation, shaping the next era of discovery, training, and clinical impact.




This is impressive, an unprecedented achievement over the past 2 decades. These nationally competitive awards underscore the strength of our resident research program, highlighting the depth, rigor, and scientific ambition in our Department. Three of the four projects are basic science while one is rooted in clinical science,

demonstrating the breadth of investigative pathways supported by UCSF Surgery.

Dr. Rebecca Plevin, Associate Professor of Surgery and Trauma & Surgical Critical Care Surgeon at ZSFG, on her appointment as **Vice Chair for the Northern California Committee on Trauma** with the **American College of Surgeons**.

Dr. Tasce Bongiovanni, Trauma & Acute Care Surgeon at ZSFG and UCSF Health, was honored with the **Joan L. & Julius H. Jacobson II Promising Investigator Award** from the **American College of Surgeons**. This national recognition highlights her impactful research and growing influence in advancing trauma and acute care surgery.



Dr. Johannes Kratz and **Dr. Jeroen Roose**'s, leadership helped secure a **\$250,000 Lopker Family Foundation award** for their project, "Advancing Two-Hit Therapy Approaches for K-Ras Mutation Cancers." Selected from 30 submissions across UCSF, the project unites collaborators from ImmunoX and the Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center to advance new two-hit therapeutic strategies for difficult-to-treat K-Ras cancers.



Dr. Ariyan Tabesh (UCSF East Bay Resident), **Dr. Shahram Aarabi** and **Dr. Michael Kohn** have received a **UCSF Catalyst Consultation Award** for their project, "**4D Volumetric Mode Ultrasound for Automated DVT Diagnosis**." This recognition highlights their innovative approach to advancing ultrasound technology and improving diagnostic accuracy.



UCSF Health appointed **Dr. Eric Nakakura** as the new **Medical Director for Mission Bay A5/A6 and UBLT**. A Stanford- and Johns Hopkins-trained surgical oncologist, Dr. Nakakura will oversee quality and throughput initiatives across Mission Bay, helping to strengthen patient care, coordination, and operational excellence.

At this year's **ACS Clinical Congress**, **Dr. Julie Ann Sosa** presented the newly released **American Thyroid Association guidelines**, which she co-developed and co-led with **Dr. Matthew Ringel** of **The Ohio State University**. The updated recommendations emphasize patient-centered care, shared decision-making, and more personalized management approaches for thyroid cancer.



Congratulations to **Dr. Tammy T. Chang**, UCSF General Surgeon, on receiving the **2025 SUS Mid-Career Award** from the **Society of University Surgeons**. This recognition highlights her innovative research, leadership, and vision in advancing surgical science.



In a new study published in **Science Advances**, **Dr. Ajay V. Maker** shows that "**Combination LIGHT Overexpression and Checkpoint Blockade Disrupts the Tumor Immune Environment Impacting Colorectal Liver Metastases**," demonstrating how a novel immunotherapy approach reshapes the immune microenvironment and eradicates tumors in preclinical models.

ZSFG UPDATE

The Division of Surgery at **Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center** closes an exceptional year defined by record clinical volume, major research advances, and noteworthy faculty achievements. Despite historic highs in trauma activations and emergency general surgery cases, our multidisciplinary team continued to deliver compassionate, high-quality care with resilience and unwavering commitment to the ZSFG mission.

The division expanded its faculty with the arrivals of **Dr. Ahmed Naiem** (Vascular Surgery) and **Dr. Nichole Starr** (General Surgery), strengthening clinical capacity and academic leadership. Research efforts accelerated with three major trauma-focused clinical trials—**PAIN**, **CAVALIAR**, and **AURORA**—led by **Dr. Lucy Kornblith** and **Dr. Joesph Cuschieri**, alongside key national guideline contributions from **Drs. Ronald B. Tesoriero** and Cuschieri. Global health collaborations also grew under the leadership of **Drs. Starr, Boeck, Kock, Dicker, Garber, and Sammann**.

This year brought significant recognition in education and leadership. **Dr. Rebecca Plevin** was appointed **Vice Chair of the Northern California Committee on Trauma**; **Dr. Kumar** received the **UCSF Lean Champion Award**; and **Drs. Collins** and **Cuschieri** earned **Academy of Medical Educators Excellence in Teaching Awards**. Additional honors included the **ASE Faculty Teaching Award** for **Dr. Andre Campbell** and the **Jacobson Promising Investigator Award** for **Dr. Tasce Bongiovanni**.

Faculty continued to shape national surgical education through leadership in **the AAST EST Emergency General Surgery Course**, **the AAST Bootcamp**, and **American College of Surgeons** programming, while sharing expertise through invited lectures, publications, and consensus initiatives. Together, these accomplishments reflect a year of remarkable impact and reaffirm the division's leadership in clinical excellence, research innovation, global engagement, and surgical education.

As we close out the year, the Division extends warm wishes to everyone for a happy holiday season and a healthy, successful New Year—and offers sincere thanks to all faculty, trainees, staff, and partners for their continued support and dedication.
